Hopefully you have checked out the write up on our social media platforms about the parliament trip on Wednesday. Thirty of our Year 12 and 13 students had the opportunity to go on this trip. One of the most amazing things about this trip was that it was all student led and organised. Well done to Kaia and the academic committee - you created a wonderful opportunity for your fellow students.

In between all this excitement this week, many of our Year 10 and 11 students sat their CAA assessments. <u>NCEA Co-requisite | NCEA (education.govt.nz)</u> These assessments are Numeracy, Writing and Reading and students need to pass them to gain NCEA Level 1. Students can sit them at NZQA allocated times of the year from Year 9 onwards. The next opportunity for our students is September. Students who do not pass this round and many of our Year 9 students, will sit the assessment at this time. Well done to all our students who prepared themselves well for these exams. We now have a wait until these results are released by NZQA. As soon as results are available, we will share with students and families.

If you have been keeping an eye on our Tuakana Teina schedule for this term you will know that we are in the middle of Waiata practice. Next week at 2pm on Friday, 31 May, each house will be performing their two Waiata for the school. Each house has been asked to do one Waiata in Te reo Māori and one in another language. It has been awesome to listen to our students practising. Each house has chosen a different international language and they are certainly challenging themselves in this space. It is impressive the respect that they are displaying for different cultures. Our competition next week is open to the community and we do hope that many of you can join us.

Our students were proud to support Pink Shirt Day this year. They managed to raise over \$600 from their non uniform day to send to the Mental Health Foundation. Importantly this day was also an opportunity to promote anti bullying and being an upstander. Thank you to everyone that has supported us by ensuring their child is in correct school uniform. It has been great to see the response of our students. Our students look sharp in their new uniform - we are so proud of them. The tuakana–teina relationship, an integral part of traditional Māori society, provides a model for buddy systems. An older or more expert tuakana (brother, sister or cousin) helps and guides a younger or less expert teina (originally a younger sibling or cousin). In a learning environment that recognises the value of ako, the tuakana–teina roles may be reversed at any time. For example, the student who yesterday was the expert on te wā and explained the lunar calendar may need to learn from her classmate today about how manaakitanga (hospitality) is practiced by the local hapū.

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Cell Phone Implications

Our front office staff are finding it difficult to locate students during break times if they need to leave school for appointments. Please communicate to your child before school if they have an appointment that day. Alternatively, please communicate your child's appointment time to the office outside of break times so they can get a message to their classroom.

Break times are Morning tea 11.15am – 11.45am / Lunch 1.15pm – 1.45pm

Confiscated Cell Phones

First time offence: Student cell phones can be collected by students at the end of the day. If a student is leaving early during the day, the office will ring home to confirm the student is not returning later in the day before they will issue them their cell phone.

Second and subsequent offences: Student cell phones will need to be collected by a caregiver. If they are leaving early, a parent will still need to come to school to collect their phone.

1. Did you envision yourself in this career?

Yes, it was long term goal to assist people with special needs. I work mostly in a dementia unit in an aged care facility.

2. How did you end up in this position?

When my youngest child started school, I re-entered the work force starting as domestic staff in an aged care facility, assisting with the tea trolley and answering bells. I did nine years as a community support worker before returning to aged care facility care giving.

3. What would you say is the hardest part of this career?

To observe people deteriorating cognitively and in health and then when they pass from dementia and other age-related ailments.

4. What are some benefits of this job?

Meeting many people and hearing each resident's story of their life. They are very interesting to listen to. Also working in a multi-disciplinary team with my colleagues.

5. What would you rate your job?

I enjoy assisting people. I rate it out 9/10.

6. What is the range that you could earn in this career? (entry level vs experienced)

Beginner with no qualification, \$22.49 to Level 4 or 12 years experience, \$29.10.

7. What did the training entail?

Orientation, manual handling training every 12 months (learning to operate sling hoist, standing hoist, sara steady, transfers standing, bed bath transfers, using sliding sheets) and level papers through careerforce.

8. What skills help you in this job?

It takes someone special to do this role. You need to be patient, have empathy, be flexible in thinking, kind, calm, reliable and punctual.

9. What is your favourite aspect of this job?

Assisting people and listening to the residents' stories, also being of comfort and a listening ear.

10. In high school, what are some opportunities that could help put people ahead?

Be open minded to try various opportunities such as career days, any skill learning, first aid courses, peer support seminars anything that is on offer, give it a go. Be mindful of attendance, read and research. Get involved in leadership roles and community events. No matter how shy you are, challenge yourself.

If students are wanting to participate in events or their sporting codes, they must abide by the expectations they have agreed.


- 80% attendance in school.



JUNIOR UNIFORM REQUIREMENTS

Uniform fitting days at the School Office - April 15-18, 10am-2pm

- All students are to wear the new lower half of the new school uniform (purchase from NZ Uniforms): Trousers, shorts, skirt or culottes.
- Students have the option to wear the new polo shirt or until the end of 2025, the existing Te Paepae o Aotea polo shirt.
- Junior students have the choice of either the school hoodie, blazer, vest or new softshell jacket. Juniors are also able to wear the existing Te Paepae o Aotea hoodie and jacket until the end of 2025.
- Students are to wear plain black or navy-blue socks. Socks cannot be worn with sandals.
- Shoes must be ALL BLACK for both closed in shoes and sandals. No crocs, no slides/scuffs.



SENIOR UNIFORM REQUIREMENTS
