### **IMPORTANT Uniform Information**

It is a Board of Trustees expectation that all students are wearing our new Te Paepae o Aotea school uniform correctly at all times. Almost all our students now have the full correct uniform and they are wearing it with pride at school and out in the community. We will continue to support students that need it, into the Te Paepae o Aotea new uniform. Please get in touch with us urgently if you need our support.

It is important to note that we will implement our new school wide uniform procedure from Day One of Term Three. Just like our Cell Phone Procedure, it has a tiered approach.

Please read the details below:

- Uniform checks are completed across the whole school by SLT randomly throughout the term.
- Whānau Teachers and Classroom teachers complete daily checks.
- If a student has an incorrect uniform item it is expected that they have a note or contact has been made to their Whānau Teacher. A uniform pass will be issued from the Whānau Teacher.
- If a student is wearing incorrect uniform, without communication from home, there are a series of consequences that will be worked through.
- Removable items will be confiscated and kept in the school safe until the end of the school day.
- Whānau will need to bring in the correct gear for the student to wear.
- Ongoing issues will work through a list of consequences resulting in interval internal stand downs/full day internal stand downs and if necessary for continued disobedience external stand downs.

### What do I need to do?

Ensure your student has the correct new Te Paepae o Aotea uniform (see the list below) and is wearing this to school every day.

Let us know NOW if you need support with purchasing the correct uniform items.

If there is a time when your child is not able to wear their correct uniform, send a note to school or make contact with their Whānau Teacher via email.

# School Skirt/Trouser Free Hemming Service

Our Textiles teacher, Mrs De'Ath has volunteered to work alongside our students to get their new Te Paepae o Aotea school uniform skirts or trousers hemmed. She will teach students how to do this and ensure the job is completed to a high standard. This will be an incredible saving for our whānau. Mrs De'Ath is available to do this on a Monday and Wednesday lunchtime in TR6. This starts from Monday, 24 June.

The tuakana–teina relationship, an integral part of traditional Māori society, provides a model for buddy systems. An older or more expert tuakana (brother, sister or cousin) helps and guides a younger or less expert teina (originally a younger sibling or cousin). In a learning environment that recognises the value of ako, the tuakana–teina roles may be reversed at any time. For example, the student who yesterday was the expert on te wā and explained the lunar calendar may need to learn from her classmate today about how manaakitanga (hospitality) is practiced by the local hapū.

On Tuesday, 5 May 2024, the Ministry of Education met with the Establishment Board of Trustees (EBOT) to discuss and commence the master planning process for the future redevelopment of Te Paepae o Aotea.

The next step is to engage the services of a master planning/lead design consultant who will work closely with the Ministry of Education and EBOT to develop a master plan and concept drawings.

We look forward to getting this project underway and will continue to provide regular updates to ensure the school and wider community remain informed of progress throughout each stage of the redevelopment project.

# **Cell Phone Implications**

Our front office staff are finding it difficult to locate students during break times if they need to leave school for appointments. ### **Confiscated Cell Phones**

**First time offence**: Student cell phones can be collected by students at the end of the day. If a student is leaving early during the day, the office will ring home to confirm the student is not returning later in the day before they will issue them their cell phone.

**Second and subsequent offences**: Student cell phones will need to be collected by a caregiver. If they are leaving early, a parent will still need to come to school to collect their phone.

# John Boyle OPTOMETRIST

#### 1. Did you envision yourself in this career?

I have always enjoyed the sciences and working with people and optometry seemed a good way to combine both. After being introduced to Optometry myself from a young age I felt it would be a good fit.

#### 2. How did you end up in this position?

I initially moved here as a graduate from Auckland. It seemed a good opportunity to work for an established practice and grow my skillset. I love living here and decided to make it home, so have never left!

#### 3. What would you say is the hardest part of this career?

Striking the perfect work life balance is difficult. Sometimes we work longer to ensure paperwork is complete, and this can be a challenge.

#### 4. What are some benefits of this job?

There is a great variety of specialisations within optometry, so there is always something new to learn. Conferences are a great way to learn and socialise with colleagues, an annual allowance provides for travel to and from these conferences.

#### 5. What would you rate your job?

8/10.

#### 6. What is the range that you could earn in this career? (entry level vs experienced)

Salary is influenced by location, in a city a graduate salary is usually lower, in a regional location it can be higher. Graduate salaries can range from \$70-110k. For more experienced optometrists, \$110k-\$225k, depending on location and years of experience.

#### 7. What did the training entail?

5 years of University study, the first year is a biomedical science year. From here, entry into the optometry programme is influenced by grades and an interview. In the final year, Optometry students are placed into practices throughout the country as well as performing shadow clinics in private practice and at Auckland Hospital.

#### 8. What skills help you in this job?

Patience, the ability to build relationships with patients and to listen to their concerns. Problem solving skills.

#### 9. What is your favourite aspect of this job?

It's always rewarding to work with patients, finding a solution that genuinely benefits them. Treating eye infections and injuries is also rewarding.

#### 10. In high school, what are some opportunities that could help put people ahead?

A solid background in the sciences is important: chemistry, biology and physics. I didn't do Physics in Year 13 and found this aspect more challenging because of it. Communication skills are just as important so I found it very useful continuing with both English and Drama through to Year 13.

Working at an optometry practice as a student is a great way to be introduced to the industry. I would highly recommend this if you are interested in optometry as a career.
