IMPORTANT Uniform Information

It is a Board of Trustees expectation that all students wear our new Te Paepae o Aotea school uniform correctly. Almost all our students now have the full correct uniform and are wearing it with pride at school and out in the community. We will continue to support students that need it into the new Te Paepae o Aotea uniform. Please get in touch with us urgently if you need our support.

It is important to note that we will implement our new school wide uniform procedure from Day One of Term Three. Just like our Cell Phone Procedure, it has a tiered approach.

Incorrect Uniform - Procedure

- 1. Incorrect uniform student has a note/email/contact from home Uniform Pass given for the time.
- 2. Incorrect uniform no communication from home:

Senior Students

Daily checks every lesson by Whānau Teacher and Classroom Teacher.

WPL and WT to ensure they have the correct uniform. Kamar written – notify teachers. Uniform Plan given if needed.

Remove item or text sent home and caregiver brings the correct gear in. Student sits and waits in the office waiting room until the items have been dropped off. *Cannot attend class in incorrect uniform.* Kamar written.

<u>Second offence</u> as above and interval internal stand down.

<u>Third offence</u> as above and full day internal stand down.

<u>Fourth offence</u> Continual disobedience – external stand down.

Junior Students

Uniform checks completed across the whole school by SLT and WPL randomly throughout the term.

Daily checks every lesson by Whānau Teacher and Classroom Teacher.

WPL and WT to ensure they have the correct uniform. Kamar written – notify teachers. Uniform Plan given if needed.

If we know they have the correct uniform

Remove item or text sent home and caregiver brings the correct gear in. Student sits and waits in the Pastoral Hub for the correct items to be dropped off. MCE/WPL may take the student home/sent home to rectify in Block One. *Cannot attend class in incorrect uniform.* Kamar written.

<u>Refusal</u> refer to WPL/SLT. Work through above process.

<u>Second offence</u> as above and interval internal stand down.

<u>Third offence</u> as above and full day internal stand down.

<u>Fourth offence</u> Continual disobedience – external stand down.

What do I need to do?

Ensure your student has the correct new Te Paepae o Aotea uniform (see the list below) and is wearing this to school every day.

Let us know NOW if you need support with purchasing the correct uniform items.

If there is a time when your child is not able to wear their correct uniform, send a note to school or contact their Whānau Teacher via email.



The tuakana—teina relationship, an integral part of traditional Māori society, provides a model for buddy systems. An older or more expert tuakana (brother, sister or cousin) helps and guides a younger or less expert teina (originally a younger sibling or cousin). In a learning environment that recognises the value of ako, the tuakana—teina roles may be reversed at any time. For example, the student who yesterday was the expert on te wā and explained the lunar calendar may need to learn from her classmate today about how manaakitanga (hospitality) is practiced by the local hapū.

Cell Phone Implications

Our front office staff are finding it difficult to locate students during break times if they need to leave school for appointments. Being part of work experience and Gateways.



Senior Music Students Workshop



This is a follow on from her selection and participation in the Bluelight Leaders camp in Auckland last year. Angel is the only representative from Taranaki heading to Samoa.




TE PAEPAE O AOTEA'S FIRST PRODUCTION DISNEY LION KING JR

Sports News

Kia ora whānau

It's been full on for the last six months with lots happening in the sports scene – be it in school, around the maunga or up and down the Island. We have reached some fantastic milestones as a kura.

We have been able to offer opportunities for our students to get involved with sports through summer and winter. It's been great to see students being active, having fun with friends, creating relationship with our community and opportunities to participate in events – TSSSA and sport exchanges.

Earlier in the year, two teams Rugby and Hockey had the opportunity to be part of a 'Gold Coast Sports Exchange'. Students experienced a different level of sports and were able to create memories. We are thankful for all the support from local business and parents who helped our teams achieve this goal.

We've offered a range of sporting activities for all abilities to get involved – cricket, volleyball, netball, rugby, hockey, football, basketball, athletics, cross country, swimming, golf, rippa, waka ama, badminton, croquet, mountain biking, outdoor bowls, squash, e-Sports.

Kathryn Moss and her team have done an outstanding job providing a range of activities and sports for our ECE students. Slight modification in areas has provided offerings that help our students to overcome fears, 'give it a go', get active and more importantly, to have fun, feel included and treated equally. Huge thanks to outside providers and staff members who have been involved.

Year 7-8 sporting activities

Our year 7/8 students have had a range of sporting opportunities. Students can participate in our school wide sports events such as swimming, athletics and cross country. Students can also participate in fortnightly Lunchtime Recreation Events that rotate through a variety of sports. Students get to show off their athletic ability and their house spirit.

The biggest event of the year for our Year 7-8 students is the Winter Sports exchange. Exchanges against Highlands, Devon and Manukorihi Intermediate schools see students compete in rugby, soccer, netball, basketball, hockey, indoor bowls, table tennis and chess.

Students have also been introduced to the summer sports exchange. This is a one-off sporting event where each code is held at a different school. Students have to opportunity to play rippa rugby, volleyball and golf.

Year 7-8 PCT Bluelight Challenge saw four mixed teams attend. This event has students run a timed Police training obstacle course. One team placed 2nd out of 61 teams around Taranaki – a fantastic result.

Two mixed rippa teams competed in the Taranaki wide Rippa Tournament held in New Plymouth. One team placed 2nd overall.

Senior Sporting Activities

Exposure and experience are important for school teams during any school tournament week. During 2024 summer tournament week we had two teams attend National events: waka ama and volleyball. In waka ama - two female teams of six attended Nationals. In volleyball, our Senior Boys team had a positive tournament with great results over the week.

Winter Tournament week is fast approaching and we have our hockey, netball, squash and croquet teams attending tournaments. All groups are training hard in their lead up with lots of fundraising and amazing support from community and businesses.

Achievement and representation within different codes as individuals or in a team at regional or a national level is something we are very proud of. It is important to acknowledge the hard work of our students and staff, their dedication and sacrifice, to achieve their goal.

Hockey

After a great pre-season tour in Queensland, Australia, winning two from three games to kick off their season, our Mixed 1st XI hockey team is unbeaten in the Championship A Boys' grade and currently top of the table, with strong stats of 29 goals and only three against. Our hockey team is busy fundraising for the Mixed Secondary Schools Hockey tournament in Whakatāne in Term 3.

Netball

Our Senior A Netball Team competed in the Taranaki Premier 3 netball competition on Friday nights, competing against competitive adult teams. Results have been mixed throughout their season with great wins and very narrow losses. Their goal is to perform well in the Lower North Island championships. The Year 7-8 Pulse Netball team have been successful in their season growing in strength each week. Te Paepae o Aotea has seven teams competing in the Hawera Netball Satellite competition on the outside netball courts on Saturdays.

Rugby

The 1st XV has been focused on building an inclusive culture around the idea of the Mangopare (Shark) including the introduction of our Team Taonga 'Te Mata o te Paepae' (The face of Te Paepae). The coaching group includes Jacob Northcott (Coach), Tre Robinson (Assistant Coach) Chris Robinson (Coach) and Angela Robinson (Manager). The 1st XV are finding their feet in the local U18 Premier TRFU competition.

The 2nd XV is coached and managed by Russell and Crystal Hockley who are building a strong 'team first' culture that will pay dividends in time. This team moved up from the U18 Development grade to the U18 Premier Grade at the start of the season.

Football

Te Paepae O Aotea's 1st XI football team have performed well this year. Our student coached teams have gone undefeated so far this season. Some very notable results include a 3-3 away draw at Inglewood and a 5-3 home win. This Te Paepae o Aotea team is currently well placed to take out the secondary schools' league.

BASKETBALL

Basketball participation has increased with our Year 7-8 and Secondary School players.

We have four Year 7-8 Mixed teams participating in the Hāwera Basketball Competition on Wednesdays at the Hub. Our teams are doing very well in the competition which sees our teams in the top four. Great to see senior students coaching our teams.

We have two Junior Boys Teams and a Senior Boys and Girls team participating in the Taranaki Secondary Schools Competition.

Girls team have gone up a grade which is a fantastic result with the Boys team doing well in their section.

Golf

Over the last term we held our school Golf Stableford Championships. It was a great day out with Te Ngutu Golf Club hosting the start of the first round of match play.
