Last term we all spent a lot of time making sure our students were in the correct uniform. We are very grateful to all students and whānau that worked with us to make this happen. The next challenge is for our students to take these high expectations into our community. They should always be wearing their uniform with pride; this includes on the way to and from school.



ERO research on Relationships and Sexuality Education

Our school has been selected to take part in national research by the Education Review Office, about Relationships and Sexuality Education. This means that some students may be invited to take part in focus group interviews early next term, that will ask them simple questions about their teaching and learning related to this area of the curriculum. The interview questions are designed to be appropriate to their level of the curriculum.

If your child is to be invited to take part in a focus group, you will be asked to provide your consent first. The ERO team will be at school on 9 August to undertake this research.

The tuakana–teina relationship, an integral part of traditional Māori society, provides a model for buddy systems. An older or more expert tuakana (brother, sister or cousin) helps and guides a younger or less expert teina (originally a younger sibling or cousin). In a learning environment that recognises the value of ako, the tuakana–teina roles may be reversed at any time. For example, the student who yesterday was the expert on te wā and explained the lunar calendar may need to learn from her classmate today about how manaakitanga (hospitality) is practiced by the local hapū.

Cell Phone Implications

Our front office staff are finding it difficult to locate students during break times if they need to leave school for appointments. Please communicate to your child before school if they have an appointment that day. Confiscated Cell Phones

First time offence: Student cell phones can be collected by students at the end of the day. If a student is leaving early during the day, the office will ring home to confirm the student is not returning later in the day before they will issue them their cell phone.

Second and subsequent offences: Student cell phones will need to be collected by a caregiver. If they are leaving early, a parent will still need to come to school to collect their phone.

Almost all our students now have the full correct uniform and are wearing it with pride at school and out in the community. 1. Did you envision yourself in this career?

Yes, I had envisioned myself in this sort of career. There were a few choices I had in mind, but being a Registered Nurse appealed to me the most.

2. How did you end up in this position?

It was a growing field and I saw the opportunities linked with the career itself. The opportunities that really stuck out to me were nursing flexibility in terms of travel and location, it allows you to expand your knowledge constantly and it is rewarding yet also challenging.

3. What would you say is the hardest part of this career?

Dealing with family and patients where emotions are heightened and their response can fluctuate and be unpredictable.

4. What are some benefits of this job?

The job itself is rewarding. Whether you assisted in providing treatment to patients or had a conversation with a lonely person and brightened their day, you contributed to making a positive difference.

5. What would you rate your job?

Overall, 8.5/10, but as with any job, there are good and bad days.

6. What is the range that you could earn in this career? (entry level vs experienced)

Entry Level: \$78,000. Experienced: Up to \$153,000 depending on nursing position and years of experience. This is all before tax.

7. What did the training entail?

Three years of university which included practical and theoretical exams and simulation labs. Also, multiple placements throughout your 3 years of training.

8. What skills help you in this job?

Being a people person is beneficial. Empathy, kindness, good listening skills and a sense of humour all go a long way.

9.What is your favourite aspect of this job?

Personally, I enjoy the gory stuff. Wounds are fascinating and applying wound dressings can be satisfying. But, overall, I appreciate the teamwork and meaningful connections you make with both your colleagues and your patients.

10. In high school, what are some opportunities that could help put people ahead?

Prerequisites include taking a science and having fundamental math skills.




TARANAKI RIPPA RUGBY TOURNAMENT
