Kia ora e te whānau

We finished this week with our inter-awa kapa haka competition. It has been great to see the learning and growth in confidence of our students over the last few weeks as they prepared for this event. I am sure you will enjoy seeing the photos of this competition later in the newsletter.

Our Kapa Haka competition marked the end of what has been a great week, on Tuesday evening we had our junior music awards and our Waiata competition. This great evening was followed up by our senior music awards on Wednesday evening. A huge thank you to our sponsors of these two evenings: Ben Thomas Panel Beaters and Halliwells. We appreciate the support we get from our local community so we can showcase our students' talents. I would like to congratulate all students who showed our school value of Paepae (being courageous and adventurous) to get up on stage and perform. They all did an amazing job and we are very proud of them.

Last week we had 30 students participate in the BP Business Challenge at the HUB for three days. Our students enjoyed working alongside business professionals as they developed a product and pitched their ideas. Thank you to Downers for being the local sponsor of this event.

Well done to our winter sports teams - most of you have finished your season and should be pleased with your efforts. Our basketball and football teams still have games, and we know you will continue to display our school values whilst representing the school.

This is the time of the year when our senior students have a lot to focus on. Practice examinations are coming up in Week 9. Tertiary providers have been visiting and there are more to come. Scholarship applications also need to be completed. If students need further support for their transition to work or further study, they should connect with their whānau teacher, pastoral lead or the transition team.

Week 9 of this term is the next opportunity for our students to sit the Common Assessment Activity (CAA) Numeracy and Literacy tests. Some of our Year 9, 10 and 11 students will be sitting these digital examinations. If you are not sure if your child is entered in these tests, please connect with their whānau teacher. Students sitting these tests should be preparing in their Literacy and Numeracy classes. They are also able to attend after school sessions if they would like further support.

Attendance remains a key focus across the country. The Ministry of Education has provided further guidance and clarification for both caregivers and schools. This information can be found at the end of this newsletter.

Last term the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA) visited to review our practises in relation to administering NZQA assessments (Level 1, 2 and 3 NCEA). Following an NZQA visit a *Managing National Assessment* report is produced for the school. Every secondary school in New Zealand goes

through this review process every few years. Our report can be found <u>here</u>. Our senior teaching staff have done a fantastic job of ensuring that we have robust processes across the school and consequently we have received a favourable report from NZQA.

Managing National Assessment review summary.

This review found that the school is effectively meeting the requirements of the Consent to Assess Against Standards on the Directory of Assessment Standards Rules 2022. No significant issues with the school's management of national assessment were found. The school's own review mechanisms allow them to identify and respond to most issues. As a school with effective assessment systems and practices for national qualifications, it is anticipated that the next Managing National Assessment review will be conducted within three to five years.

This term we also had the privilege of having our Education Review Office visit. The report from this visit is currently being drafted and once finalised, we will be able to share this review with you also.

Next week we have our netball and hockey teams away at tournament week. We know they will play well and represent our school with pride. Keep an eye out for their results throughout the week.

We begin visits to our feeder schools over the next few weeks. Please encourage students who are attending Te Paepae o Aotea in 2025 to complete the enrolment process as soon as practicable. Our prospectus and other important information for 2025 can be found on our website.

Thank you for all your support with uniform. Our students are looking great. Please continue to connect with us if you need further support in this area.

Important Senior Information

The end of team is a busy time for senior students with several assessment opportunities occurring. These are:

- CAA's (some students in Year 9-11)
- Practice exams for Year 12-13
- External digital submissions (EDS) Year 11

12-17 September. 18 - 24th September. Week 6, Term 3 Week 2, Term 4

Below are the timetables. Students are to make themselves familiar with when their assessments are on.

There is no study leave for Year 12-13 during practice exams. You are expected to be in class learning or revising if you are not sitting in an exam. Your teacher will tell you if you are sitting your exam digitally and when you need to come prepared with your battery at 100%.

CAA's and practice exams will be held in the Jubilee Gym.

These assessments are extremely important for students. It is important to sit the CAA's for literacy and numeracy. The EDS are new for NCEA this year and so it is important that all students attempt these. All achievement standard courses will have at least 1 EDS standard.

Practice exams for Year 12 & 13 will give students a good indication of where you are in your preparation for external exams. The results from these exams will contribute to prizegiving results and should you for some reason not be able to sit the NZQA exams, these grades will be used.

To prepare yourself for assessments

- Ensure your class notes are complete.
- Set aside time every night to read through your notes/exemplars/questions.
- Utilise the expertise of staff at the afterschool sessions.
- Complete all work set in class.



The tuakana–teina relationship, an integral part of traditional Māori society, provides a model for buddy systems. An older or more expert tuakana (brother, sister or cousin) helps and guides a younger or less expert teina (originally a younger sibling or cousin). In a learning environment that recognises the value of ako, the tuakana–teina roles may be reversed at any time. For example, the student who yesterday was the expert on te wā and explained the lunar calendar may need to learn from her classmate today about how manaakitanga (hospitality) is practiced by the local hapū.



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Attendance

One of the things we are continuing to focus on this term is student attendance. You will hear us talking about this with you, with our students and it remains a strong subject of conversation in the staff room.

If a student misses one day of school every two weeks, they miss more than a whole year of school by 16 years of age. As a parent or caregiver, you, alongside our school, play a key role in building strong habits of regular school attendance.

All students are legally required to attend school every day and it is a shared responsibility to make sure students attend and engage in learning from when they first start school.

You must let the school know if your child is going to be absent or intends to be absent for a portion of the school term for whatever reason, like a tangi or medical procedure. Family holidays or taking time off for extracurricular activities (not organised by school) are not acceptable reasons for being absent.

We know that autumn has certainly brought its crisp mornings and winter is coming with all its chills, bugs and colds. Knowing if your child is well enough to go to school can be tricky at times. Health New Zealand | Te Whatu Ora have refreshed their guidance for schools and parents to use to help make that call. Check out the Ministry of Education <u>website</u> for more information. If you are still unsure, get in touch with us.

At our school we have strong processes and hygiene practices in place to make sure our school environment is as healthy as possible for our students and our staff.

If you're struggling at home with getting your child to school, talk to us! Our school is committed to supporting your child to attend school and building a culture that fosters excellent attendance by having:

- School staff who have strong relationships with students and whānau.
- A school culture that recognises your child and your family for who they are, where they come from and who they want to be.
- A school community that does everything to make sure students are at school, and they are participating, and progressing in their education.
