The Establishment Board of Trustees (EBoT) applied for an alternative constitution but the Minister of Education has declined this application. While the EBoT does not agree with this decision and this is not the desired outcome, the EBoT is committed to moving the school forward. Therefore, the school will transition to an elected board, with the timing of the new board coinciding with Matariki. The EBoT has valued its nga iwi partnership through the establishment phase of the school, which has set the school on a positive pathway. The New Zealand School Board Association will run board sessions for the community prior to the elections for potential board members.


It's been fantastic to see everyone getting involved in activities and supporting our teams in recent fundraisers. Your enthusiasm and school spirit have truly stood out!





TE PAEPAE O AOTEA has accepted the challenge! Please help us

What's the challenge all about?

Bottle and container lids are the most common contaminant in kerbside recycling. Milk tops (and other small lids and caps) are too small to be recycled through kerbside recycling collections.

Milk bottles are something almost all Taranaki homes have, but the tops are often placed back on milk bottles when empty and then put in the recycling bin. This means the recycling bin is contaminated with an item that cannot be recycled through the kerbside processing system. We want to encourage the separation of bottles and tops, so that we reduce the risk of recycling bin contents going to landfill.

The three district councils in Taranaki are participating in this challenge, seeing schools as a great collection point for their communities. Stratford trialed this challenge in 2024 and 11 schools collected 135,000 lids across 2 terms.

Our Community Leaders will be collecting the bottle and container lids please drop off at the school office

What tops are we collecting?

We accept all coloured tops from dairy milk and cream plastic bottles. Boring Oat Milk and other alternative milk that comes in plastic bottles are also okay, but no boxed/liquid paperboard milk lids please. They must be the standard size that would be found on a 1,2, or 3-litre bottle.

What are the students asked to do?

For term 2, your children will be asked to separate and collect milk bottle tops at home and bring them into school.

How can you support this challenge?

Get the whole whānau involved in the habit of separating tops from bottles. Support your children by collecting the milk tops off empty milk bottles, showing them how to give them a quick rinse, let them air dry, and then encourage your children to bring them into school in a reusable container or bag that can be emptied into the collection bin.

Do we need to wash the milk tops?

Yes please! Milk residue can get a bit stinky, so please take the time to rinse and air dry your caps before placing them in your collection bin.

Where do the collected

milk tops end up?

Following the challenge, we will be sending the milk tops to Egmont Refuse & Recycling Ltd in Hāwera which shred the tops on-site and sell the chip to local and international fabricators.

Is there a prize for the school who collects the most caps? Yes, of course! The winning school in South Taranaki will be announced at the end of the challenge. There will be three prizes \$1000, \$750, \$500 for the South Taranaki schools that collects the most lids per student which can be spent on sports equipment, stationary, library books, art supplies etc. it's the winning school's choice!

Recommended locations of smoke alarms

by Fire and Emergency New Zealand

Where	Reason why	~
In every bedroom	We can't smell smoke when we're asleep.	
In every hallway	Alerts the whole family giving more time to escape. The hallway is normally the main escape path.	
On every level	So those upstairs get early warning.	
In the main living area	Early warning from hazards (heating, electrical etc) in this area.	
NOT in the kitchen	Smoke alarms are not designed for kitchens or other areas where steam or vapours will cause of false alarms (heat/thermal alarms are recommended in kitchens, laundries and garages).	

Under the Residential Tenancies Regulations a minimum of 1 working smoke alarm within 3 metres of a sleeping space is required. Fire and Emergency recommends more than this to ensure early detection and enable you have time to escape a fire. Ensure all smoke alarms meet the Australian and/or British safety standards

Installing smoke alarms

Where	Reason why	~
On the ceiling	Smoke rises. For early detection	
More than 300mm from walls	To avoid dead spots close to walls, beams and corners.	
Out of the path of heat pumps and ventilation systems	Prevents unwanted activations from dust getting blown into the alarms.	
Away from indoor fireplaces	Smoke escapes when putting wood in the fire. Install it at least 3m away from the firebox.	
More than 300mm from lights	Prevents unwanted alarms from heat and dust buildup.	
At least 1m away from ducts/ vents	Prevents air and dust being blown into or past the detector.	

New builds (and some renovations requiring consent) require interconnected smoke alarms be installed.



Less prone to unwanted alarms. Activates quickly to alert you to smoothering fires give more time to escape. Longg-life The longific hattery is huilt into.

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Which smoke

alarm should I get?

> Long-life The long-life battery is built into the alarm. The battery does not need replacing and should last up to 10 years.
