## **PSYCHOLOGY TRIP, UNIVERSITY OF AUCKLAND**



An early 5am start didn't dampen student excitement as they set off for Auckland, arriving ready for a full day of learning. Students attended two insightful lectures: the first by Dr Tania Cargo, speaking about child and adolescent mental health with a focus on culturally responsive parenting therapies, followed by Associate Professor, Gwenda Willis, exploring strengths-based approaches to addressing offending behaviour, drawn from her work in forensic psychology.

Over at the AMRF Medical Sciences Learning Centre Whakaaro Pai, students were fascinated by preserved human organs and the opportunity to participate in hands-on experiments, including activities showing how the brain can be tricked by mixed body signals.




## NGĀ WHAKATAETAE MŌ NGĀ MANU KŌRERO
